1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Sanmati Government College of Science Education and Research, Jagraon (Ludhiana) was established in July, 1968. It was inaugurated by the Home minister Sh. Y. B. Chavan on 18th july, 1968. Our college has been accredited with 'B++' grade by NAAC in cycle I and cycle II of accreditation. The college was selected, under Star College Scheme in life Sciences by DBT, Ministry of Science and Technology, Government of India in 2009. Ours is the only government college in northern India, imparting education to the students, exclusively in science subjects hailing mainly from rural areas. The college successfully runs B.Sc.Medical, B.Sc.Non-Medical, M.Sc.Botany and M.Sc.Chemistry with total strength of 505 in this session. The sprawling lush green eco-friendly campus spread over 42 acres provides highly conducive environment for the holistic development of the students.

In the establishment of the college, Jain society especially, Matri-Sewa Sangh, Jagraon and the patron respected Shri. Bimal Muni Ji has given an incredible contribution. Under their patronage, approximately 42 acres of land was given to the Govt.as a charity for the building of the college. College is situated on Jagraon –Raikot road. It is about 5 km away from bus stand and 4 km from the railway station. College is situated in the natural and open environment which has earned it the name of mini Shanti Niketan. The botanical garden of the college is spread over more than three acres and is considered to be the best from among the gardens of the govt. colleges of Punjab. It hosts more than 300 plants (of more than 200 types) which are arranged according to Bentham and Hooker system. The beautiful double storey building of the college has eleven smart class rooms to facilitate teaching learning process.

To widen the horizon of knowledge of the faculty and students, dignitaries from renowned institutes are invited to deliver lectures. Educational tours are arranged to research labs to orient them towards research work. Books, Journals and Magazines are made available for updating the knowledge of teachers and students. With the help of star college scheme, RUSA and UGC, ICT facility has also been updated.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The teaching-learning process focuses on the needs of the students. Various effective and efficient teaching-learning processes to attain excellence in academics have evolved over the years.

The admission process for all the programmes is fair and transparent. The reservation policy is implemented according to the rules during admissions every session.

Student-teacher ratio is optimum. Student-centric methods are used to ensure efficacious teaching & learning process. Advanced learners are motivated to participate and excel in academic & co-curricular activities. slow learners are provided extra time and guidance by the teachers.

Mentor-Mentee system has been introduced where mentors are actively engaged in providing academic, psychological and general counselling to the mentees.

Mechanism for internal assessment is standardized by Panjab University, Chandigarh and is transparent. Assignments, Tests, Seminars are held periodically. Students' academic performance, participation in activities and interaction in class are also considered.

POs and COs are uploaded on the college website. The performance of students in university exams/results and job placements indicates the level of attainment.

Feedback is obtained from students to ensure that teaching is effective and student-centric.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Sanmati Govt. College of Science Education And Research in Jagraon has been actively involved in various extension activities to promote the all-round development of its students. The college has received grants from different sources over the years, including INR 53 lakhs from DBT in 2017-18, INR 63.14 lakhs from RUSA in 2018-19, and INR 52.39 lakhs from RUSA in 2021-22. It has also conducted Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) workshops in 2021-22.

The faculty has published research papers and books/chapters, with an increase in the number of publications over the years. In 2017-18, two research papers and one book/chapter were published, while in 2019-20, one research paper and two book/chapters were published. The numbers increased to four research papers and four book/chapters in 2021-22. The college has also engaged in collaborations, with a total of two collaborations during the specified period.

The institution focuses on developing scientific aptitude among students and organizes various programs such as workshops, seminars, and educational tours to expose them to the latest scientific developments. The teachers actively support students in their assignments and presentations to enhance their logical reasoning and confidence. The college provides access to well-equipped labs for hands-on training.

The institution aims to foster an ecosystem for innovation and knowledge transfer. It organizes the Science Fiesta program annually, promoting scientific temperament, research aptitude, and creative thinking among students. Despite the challenges posed by the pandemic, the institution adapted its activities to an online format to benefit students. Additionally, the college emphasizes creating a pollution-free environment and has

conducted plantation drives in collaboration with various organizations.

The institution also focuses on providing assistance to economically disadvantaged students by offering free books from the library. It strives to make education accessible to all and empower students for a better future.

Furthermore, the college has engaged in various extension activities over the past five years. These activities include assembly for new students, celebrations of International Yoga Day, voter awareness camps, Independence Day celebrations, road safety programs, and Poshan Maah awareness programs. The college has also participated in programs like DAPO and Buddy Program, Youth Parliament, and organized lectures on various topics.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The lush green campus of Sanmati Government College of Science Education and Research is spread over 42 acres. The constructed area includes a college building which is E shaped, college canteen, Girls hostel, Auditorium and Rusa block. Ours is a mono faculty college imparting education in science and runs UG and two PG programs. There are 7 classrooms in the college which are fully equipped and ICT facilities. Three classrooms out of seven are recently equipped with digital display panels having android 10 and window 10 configuration.

College has 11 well-equipped and well maintained laboratories. Seven of 11 laboratories are ICt enabled. College has a total of 14 ICT enabled classrooms, laboratories.

College has two Air conditioned auditorium halls of 1800 sq ft and 1930 sq ft built up area with seating capacity of 150 and 250 for organising various cultural and academic activities. Both seminar halls are ICT enabled. Outdoor and indoor gaming facility for promoting physical and mental health is available in the college. Outdoor facility includes athletic track, football ground, short put, volleyball and indoor facilities are table tennis, Badminton, carrom, chess, skipping rope etc. Gymnasium facility is provided in campus as well as in girls hostel.

College has a Sir C. V. Raman spacious, well ventilated and well lit main library and four departmental libraries with approximately 18017 books, 24 journals, 431 reference books, and NLIST facility for exploring eresources. Library has an Air Conditioned reading hall and UGC cum browsing centre.

The college is equipped with the latest configuration 61 computers, 16 printers among which 11 are all in one and a Wi-Fi facility with 3 connections of 100mbps and one connection of 50 Mbps bandwidth.

Campus Area is kept under 24/7 surveillance with CCTV Cameras for facilitating a secure environment for all the students. College has a very systematic approach towards procedures and policies for maintaining physical, academic and other support facilities.

Student Support and Progression

Our college takes pride in the fact that we have well-established mechanisms in place to provide continuous

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

Multidisciplinary Education aims at providing creative combinations of disciplines in education that integrates the Humanities and Arts with Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics. Flexible curricular structures will enable creative combinations of disciplines for study, and would offer multiple entry and exit points, thus, removing currently prevalent rigid boundaries and creating new possibilities for life-long learning. Being a mono faculty college, we are now planning to introduce interdisciplinary courses also along with the traditional courses. We have decided about certain courses which can be offered to the students and list has also been sent to Panjab University, Chandigarh

	for kind consideration. The multidisciplinary approach will be introduced as and when directed by the concerned university.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	Our institution is making every possible effort to create awareness among the students about the academic bank of credits and majority of students have registered for ABC account. A teacher has been appointed nodal officer for streamlining the process of registration for ABC accounts. the tutors have been guided and doing this task in the tutorial groups. The students are being told about the benefits of ABC accounts in the tutorial periods
3. Skill development:	Skill development is the need of the hour and college life is the right time to develop skills in the youth so that they settle well in life. The ultimate aim of any one is to earn money and lead a comfortable life. Our college started a certificate course in mushroom cultivation feeling its rising importance as a startup. 44 students enrolled for the course and learnt about the procedures to cultivate mushroom and protect them from various diseases. In the next session, a certificate course in open office (Apache) was started to provide basic knowledge of computer to the students.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	India has a rich culture and heritage and it becomes our duty to preserve it for future generations. In Our College, Punjabi is taught to the first year students as a subject. Teachers of other subjects also translate and discuss the topics in the mother tongue, Punjabi for better understanding and students interact in Punjabi. All the important days including mother tongue day are celebrated with full enthusiasm. The students are encouraged to read Punjabi literature to arouse their interest in Punjabi culture and heritage. The student participate in youth festival aimed at preserving the rich culture of Punjab.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	Our college is affiliated to Panjab University, Chandigarh and the syllabus of different courses is decided by the university college follows and implements it as such. All the departments have well defined program outcomes and course outcomes. Program outcomes and course outcomes are also displayed on the institutional website to provide information to the students. Being a science college, the science students are duly informed about the

	outcomes of their programs of B.Sc. and M.Sc. and of various courses included in their program.
6. Distance education/online education:	Ours is a science college and as science is a practical subject so it is difficult to provide distance or online education to the students. As our college caters to the students of rural areas, where there is network issue and it becomes difficult to provide online education. Although the students are given information about the various online platforms like Swayam, Moocs etc. to help them in getting online information. However, our college made every arrangement to conduct online classes successfully during the pandemic. Many faculty development programs were conducted to update faculty members to conduct online classes through various apps. The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

The college is affiliated to Punjab University, Chandigarh and the curriculum is framed by the university. The college implements it as such. However, the teachers can send their suggestions to the members of the Board of Studies in this regard.

- 1. The university prepares the academic calendar and college adheres to that during the academic session. The academic calendar is incorporated in the prospectus and also displayed on the official website of the institution.
- 2. The time table is prepared in the beginning of the session. The same is then displayed on the notice board for information of students and is also circulated among the teachers for the proper implementation.
- 3. The teachers of various departments prepare the detailed schedule of topics/lectures to be delivered in class in advance for the timely, systematically and effective completion of the syllabus.
- 4. Assignments are given to students to improve their reasoning, writing skills and develop problem-solving skills.
- 5. The teachers conduct the class tests from time to time. These tests help the students to prepare for their course work in time.
- 6. While making the schedule of work, all the departments consult the academic calendar as given by the university for that particular session. The schedule of work is prepared in such a way that the curriculum gets completed in specified days (approx.90 days, well in time) and revision tests and evaluation work also goes on smoothly. The teachers make a schedule of continuous evaluation of students, plan the assignments and class tests in advance. The teachers analyze the performance of the students from the class tests and discussions. In this way, they recognize the fast and slow learners. They adopt various techniques to bring them at par with other students. The students are also given assignments/seminars to enhance in-depth knowledge of the subject and to enhance their learning experience/reasoning ability. The students are also informed about the criteria of evaluation and internal assessment. So that, they are also mentally prepared for the same. Student can approach teachers in free lectures to clear their doubts. The teachers are instructed to complete the syllabus in the allotted time frame. They are encouraged to use projectors, online platforms for better understanding of the concepts. For the better dissemination of knowledge to students and for making teaching and learning more interesting, 8 classrooms are having projectors. Apart from classrooms, laboratories are also equipped with projectors and wi-fi connection. The college has a virtual classroom also.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1

Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability in transacting the Curriculum

Response:

To achieve the mission of the college that is transcend to rise above limits, the students are taught basic ethics like obedience, truthfulness, honesty, objectivity etc.

- 1. Professional ethics: Professional ethics is one of the many virtues that a college student must inculcate as students will soon step into the professional life after college. Assembly is organised at the inauguration of the session to communicate the code of ethics to staff and students. In our college, professional ethics are taught to students as part of their holistic development. Students attend the tutorial groups in which they imbibe human values which are integral part of professional ethics. During their lab sessions, students learn qualities like teamwork, obedience, cooperation spontaneously. Apart from these curricular activities, students infuse ethical values from co-curricular activities. Induction programme is organised at the inauguration of the session to communicate the code of ethics to staff and students.
- 1. Gender equality: The college is a co-ed college so it itself provides equal opportunities to girls well as boys. In our college, girls outnumber boys in every course, but still college ensures equal participation of boys in every event. Besides this girl students along with female staff are part of women forum which is formed every year. This forum creates awareness among girl students by organising various activities like seminars to enhance the overall personality of the students. Students get knowledge about protection laws under Part III 'Violence against women and children' of subject 'Environmental studies and Road safety rules, that are taught to BSc I as compulsory subject.
- 2. **Human values**: The tutorial groups are formed in the beginning of the session. Each teacher is allotted a group of 25-30 students. During the tutorials, the teachers discuss their problems and

also encourage students to develop human values like equality, tolerance, patience, obedience, punctuality. In the practical session, we form teams to perform practical which enhance the quality of cooperation and team work in the students. During the language subjects, students learn moral values from the literature.

4. Environment and sustainability: The college campus is home to many species of flora and fauna. College campus has lavish botanical garden and trees are planted according to Bentham and Hooker system of classification and one micro-forest. There is a vermicomposting unit in our campus that provides knowledge regarding biodegradation of waste. Solar panels are also installed in our college. There is zero runoff water. College sets a real time example of environmental sustainability for the students. Apart from this, the students of M.Sc. Botany go on various field trips where they can learn to connect with nature. Also students of Botany prepare herbariums which give them an opportunity to understand and study flora. The curriculum of B.Sc. contain references to concept of environmental degradation, climate change, global resources depletion, conservation of natural resources and ecology. Every year, Department of Botany organises plantation drive, in which students and staff participate with enthusiasm for maintenance of green belt.

2.3.1

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

The college follows a student centric approach for the all round development of the students. While making any policy or taking any decision, the college authorities take into consideration the best interests of the students. Along with the class room teaching, emphasis is laid on experiments which give a platform to the students for learning and being in touch with the real world.

Project Work:

Different minor projects are given to the students of M.Sc Chemistry and M.Sc Botany to inculcate the research aptitude. The project work helps the students in developing logical thinking, analytical skills and inculcate the habit of innovation in them.

Interactive method:

The students are encouraged to participate in group discussions, quizzes, discussions, debates, PPT competitions etc. Various topics are covered under these interactive methods. Teachers make classes interactive and encourage innovative thoughts. Audio- visual methodology, Google Classroom, Industrial Visits, field work and projects are some of the means adopted by various departments to provide experiential and participative learning.

ICT enabled methods:

ICT enabled methods of teaching include use of smart classrooms, computer labs etc. to make teaching and learning more effective and interesting for the students. The infra-structure of the college includes 9 class rooms of which 7 have been converted into smart class rooms, 11 well equipped laboratories, computer lab, The total number of laboratories in college are 11 and 2 are under construction. 7 out of 11 laboratories are equipped with projectors and LAN connection.

Experiential learning:

The students are taken on the educational tours to the zoo to learn about animals through observation along with reading about them. Post Graduate students of botany visit Mussorie, Dehradun etc to collect different flora and to study them. Different departments organised workshops to provide an oppurtunity for experiential learning to the students.

Participative learning:

The students are given an opportunity to draw diagrams, solve questions on the blackboard to boost their morale and confidence and students get prepared for theory and practical subjects. Students present seminars in front of the entire class which help them to overcome stage fear and develop oratory skills.

Doubt discussion encourages the students to clarify their doubts immediately without effecting the performance by ensuring firm hold on the fundamentals of the subject. Online platforms like recorded lectures on you tube by faculty help the weaker students to go through those lectures many times for the clarity of the concept. Recorded lectures allow the students to access the learning material at a time of their convinience in case if they miss any lectures.

The institution follows guidelines issued by Panjab University for internal assessment in theory as well as in practicals from time to time. The students are informed about the weightage of each parameter of the Internal Assessment in the Assembly. The college uses the formative and summative evaluation approaches to measure student's achievement for the internal assessment.

Formative Approaches: Attendance record, classroom interactions, seminars, assignments, project work, field visit and laboratory sessions.

Summative Approaches: Mid Semester Tests

College Registrar office prepares the Date Sheet for conducting MSTs which is then displayed on the notice board. All the subject teachers are asked to submit the question papers to the Registrar. Mid semester tests are conducted according to the date sheet by arranging proper seating plans and attendance is recorded. Then the answer sheets are evaluated by the teachers and shown to the students so that they come to know about their mistakes and get their doubts clarified from their teachers. After the evaluation of answer sheets, award lists of all the subjects are prepared and submitted to the College Registrar.

The internal assessment is displayed on the notice board for the information of students. The college ensures full transparency in the process of evaluation and internal assessment so that they can learn from their mistakes and improve upon their performance in the future examinations.

End Semester Exams are conducted by the Panjab University, Chandigarh and the college provides necessary infrastructure and staff for smooth conduction of exams.

GRIEVANCE REDRESSAL SYSTEM

Grievance Redressal Committee has duly been constituted to deal with all grievances including the ones related with examination. Students register their complaints, then the complaints are verified and time-bound appropriate actions are taken by the grievance redressal committee.

- At the college level, in case any student is not able to appear in mid semester examination due to medical or any genuine reason, the student is provided opportunity to appear in the reexamination, provided he/she submits application with proper documents.
- If any student scores less marks and wants to improve in that subject, he/she can appear in the rescheduled examination.
- Any correction in the total of marks as identified by the students is immediately done by the faculty members.
- At the university level, with reference to evaluation if the student scores less marks than expected, then there is a provision of Re-evaluation of the final results after paying the prescribed fee.

Tissue culture lab in department of Botany provides students with hands on training. Tissue culture lab is equipped with Refrigerated centrifuge, Rotary shaker. Zoology and UG Botany labs also have MIPS system. Chemistry department is equipped with HPLC facility for staff and students. Physics lab has a dark room, Scintillation counter and GM counter.

Objectives: College ensures every effort to encourage/empower women and provide them safe/congenial-atmosphere.

Context: Staff makes efforts to prepare Girl students for facing challenges, create awareness on rights/privileges/identity, address problems, provide counselling, eradicate evils like dowry system and female foeticide.

Practice: Women-Forum was established with aim of empowering girl-students/female-teachers. The college has also established a Sexual harassment prevention cell.
